MIA BULJAN: Daniel, what did she just say? Say it again, La'Nya.

STUDENT: She forgot the six but if she didn't forget the six she would've gotten a hundred.

MIA BULJAN: So what did she just say? Kalaya what? Say it again, La'Nya, nice and loud.

STUDENT: Kalaya forgot the six but if she didn't forget the six she would get a hundred.

MIA BULJAN: So stop after the first sentence. Kalaya forgot what?

STUDENT: She forgot the six and...

MIA BULJAN: Okay, stop there. Daniel, did Kalaya forget a six? Or are you not sure?

STUDENT: I'm not sure.
